PRESIDENT'S REPORT FOR 2018

A Wonderful 2018 — "We have not changed — We want the best for our community."

The community has continued to be a clean, safe and livable place to call home. We know that together will working keep our residents informed and our community livable, clean and safe. Thanks to the long hours of the Officers, Block Captains, volunteers, home owners, public agencies and Park and Recreation.

Truly our home is our most valuable asset and is included in our financial worth or wealth. The Millwood-Waterford community continues to do volunteer work inside and outside of the community and has partnership with Park and Recreation, Department of Public Works (DPW&T), Department of Environment (DOE); Department of Permits and Inspection (DPIE), our three community schools and the Community cops officers (COP). We know that working together will keep our residents informed and our community livable, clean and safe.

The residents also continue to do bi-annual and annual clean ups on Shady Glen Drive, Walker Mill Road, Addison Road South Shopping Center and at our community schools, John E Bayne Elementary School and Central High School.

The Block Captains are the life line of the community and do a wonderful job informing the residents of events and meetings — deliver monthly flyers to all residents — to keep them knowledgeable on current and new regulations in the County.

The community has sponsored many tours, trips, programs and plays — see (Community Events, Outings and Activities report).

Our Scholarship Committee continues to give up to \$8,000 a year in scholarships (see report). We have donated over \$5,000 in lunch funds, uniforms and supplies to our 3 community schools.

Our National Night Out in August, held at Millwood

Park hosted over 65 residents with hamburgers, hot dogs, games, prizes and good fellowship.

In September our annual picnic at Millwood Park served hot dogs, hamburgers and many home cooked dishes. Over 75 people attended including our county officials and candidates. We enjoyed our last outing for 2018.

Our community has attracted several new home owners. New residents are given a package of the By-laws and other necessary information to enable them to make a smooth transfer to their new neighborhood, and are encouraged to attend meetings and events.

Our monthly meetings have one or two speakers from our County agencies, Police department, Schools, contractors, new candidates, Park and Recreation, business, Health Department and other persons of interest. We are an informed community.

"Block Captains on the Go"

You think that the "Block Captains" are standing still!!! NO — we see that signs are still posted on our community telephone posts, stuck in the grass, curbs, and anywhere else marketers can post them. Everyone thinks someone should pick up the trash or remove the signs in our community, but, they just don't know who should do it. Well look in the mirror, the person you see there — yourself — may be able to help.

No, our block captains cannot do it all. They do need a little help delivering flyers, trip information, County materials and also to collect dues. They also help "set-up" for our big events. Several of the Block Captains received an award at our December Awards night for their thankless efforts. Some streets do not have a Block captain — no one on these streets wants to help spread the news. Therefore, some residents are not getting MWCA's free information due to lack of help.

Housing violations, trash dumping on our street, cars parked on wrong side of street, cars parked on grass, cars parked in yard with flat tires, dead tags, inoperable vehicles, and commercial cars parked overnight in yards are county violations. The Department of Inspection and Enforcement (DPIE); Department of Environment (DOE); Department of Public Works and Transportation (DPW&T) and the Community Orient Police (COP) are all employed to keep the communities livable and safe. There are

always representatives from the County who come to our meetings to speak on different subjects. So please come out to meet them and ask questions. Our Block Captains are volunteers and cannot and do not issue violation notices. The above agencies are responsible for these issues.

The dog walker or owner is responsible for taking a poop bag with them when they walk their "dog" on the street, on the walking trail, or in the park so they can pick up behind their dog. It is just a matter of decency and respect for others.

The Block Captains request your help in keeping our community clean. The Block Captain depends on your help in maintaining a livable and safe community. We all take pride in this community. We love living here and so should you. We hope you will also take pride and adhere to the following: (1) Put yard waste out on Sunday evening for pickup on Monday; (2) Not put trash and recycle cans out on Friday, Saturday, and Sunday for pickup on Tuesday; (3) Please, please remove trash containers from the street by Wednesday; (4) Attend our informative Community meeting every 2nd Monday at 7:30 p.m.; and (5) Read your meeting flyer and all information that is distributed each month.
